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## What is Jazz?

**Jazz** is a style of music where musicians play together without following a strict script. Instead of reading every note perfectly, they **improvise**—which means they make up the music as they go along. It's exciting, unpredictable, and full of personality.

Jazz uses **rhythm** and **syncopation**, which means the beat isn't always where you expect it. Musicians often play slightly ahead or behind the main beat, creating a swinging, bouncy feeling that makes people want to move.

Think of it like a conversation between musicians. Instead of following a script, each person adds their own ideas while listening to what others are playing.

## Where Did Jazz Come From?

Jazz was born in **New Orleans, Louisiana** in the early **1900s**. It happened because of a unique mix of cultures coming together. The city had people from **Africa, Europe, the Caribbean, and America** all living close to each other.

**African slaves** brought rhythms and call-and-response singing. **European** settlers brought instruments like trumpets, trombones, and pianos. **Caribbean** musicians contributed their own rhythmic styles. When these traditions mixed together, something completely new was created.

Think of it like mixing different paint colours together. You start with blue, yellow, and red, but when you blend them, you get entirely new colours nobody had seen before.

## Key Features of Jazz

Jazz has several special ingredients that make it different from other music.

**Improvisation** is the most important—musicians create music on the spot.

**Syncopation** gives it a swinging rhythm. **Harmony** is complex, with interesting chords. And **call-and-response** comes from African music traditions, where one instrument or voice answers another.

Famous jazz musicians like **Louis Armstrong**, **Duke Ellington**, and **Ella Fitzgerald** became legends by playing with feeling and creativity.
