How Books and Websites Are Different

When you read a book, you start on page **1** and move forward in order. Every time you pick up the book, you know exactly where you are. Books are **linear** — they have a beginning, middle, and end that the author decided for you.

Websites are completely different. There's no single path to follow. You might click a **link**, jump to a different section, go back, or skip around however you want.

Hyperlinks let you bounce between pages instantly.

Think of it like this: reading a book is like following a marked hiking trail from start to finish. Reading a website is like being in a maze where you can teleport between any room you've discovered.

How Our Eyes Work Differently

Research shows that people read websites differently than books. When reading a book, your eyes move smoothly across each line. With websites, your eyes **scan** and **jump** around. You might read the headline, skip to the first paragraph, glance at images, and hunt for bold text — all in a random order.

Books have clear paragraphs and chapters. Websites have short chunks, bullet points, and lots of white space. This is intentional: websites are designed to help you find information fast, not to sit with one thought for a long time.

Think of it like this: reading a book is like watching a whole film from beginning to end. Reading a website is like flipping through a photo album, stopping at the pictures that interest you most.

Distractions and Focus

Books are focused. A book has one author, one story, and very few distractions. Your job is simple: turn pages and keep reading.

Websites are full of distractions. There are ads, pop-ups, notifications, and links to **thousands** of other pages. Your attention gets pulled in many directions at once. Studies show that this makes it harder to remember what you read on websites compared to books.

Permanence and Change

A book stays the same forever. Once it's printed, the words don't change. You can return to the same page years later and find identical text.

Websites change constantly. A website you visit today might look completely different next week. Content gets deleted, moved, or updated. This makes websites less reliable for finding the exact same information twice.

Both books and websites have important roles. Books are better for deep, focused learning. Websites are better for quick lookups and exploring topics. Understanding the difference helps you read more effectively.
