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What Is a Password?

A **password** is like a secret code that only you know. It protects your online accounts — things like your email, school portal, gaming accounts, or social media. When you log in, you type your password to prove that you're really you, not someone pretending to be you.

Why Keep It Private?

If someone else learns your password, they can pretend to be you online. They could read your private messages, change your settings, delete your photos, or even use your account to contact your friends. This is called **identity theft** or **account hijacking**.

What Can Hackers Do?

People called **hackers** try to guess or steal passwords. Once they have yours, they might:

- **Damage your reputation** — by posting mean things as if you wrote them
- **Access important accounts** — like banking or school systems

Think of it like someone stealing your house key. Once they have it, they can enter whenever they want. Your password is the same — it's the key that opens your digital home.

How to Keep Your Password Safe

Make your password **strong** by using a mix of capital letters, numbers, and symbols. Never share it with friends — not even your best friend. Don't write it down where others can see it. Use different passwords for different accounts, so if one gets stolen, the others stay safe.

Two-factor authentication adds an extra layer of protection. It asks you to prove who you are in two ways, not just with your password. For example, you might need your password plus a code sent to your phone.
